widow has put in more than all the others. All these people gave their gifts out of their wealth; but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on" (Luke 21:1-3).


At the October LWML Interdepartmental Meeting in St. Louis, we had the opportunity to celebrate the amazing amount of \$100 million dollars given in support of the mission goal since the founding of the organization almost 70 years ago. What an awesome goal this is as we continue to reach out to share the joyful news of Christ our Lord throughout the world. This amount includes the mission grant goals of the LWML and the 40 districts. The LWML mite goal for 2011-13 is \$1.825 million dollars and next year the 40 districts will be selecting new mission grants and new mite goals for the next biennium. Our spirit for missions has never changed since the founding of the organization.

Have you checked out the resources available from the LWML website? There are a number of items available for free download. For example, online are colorful Mission Power posters for each of the 19 mission grants, a monthly featured grant with a devotion, prayer guide and story for personal or group settings and Mite Marathon flyers that offer fun ideas and ways for supporting the mission goal. These are just a few resources available. On the South Dakota District LWML website, a prayer is available to download for each of the mission grants once it is paid. We currently have two grants remaining to fund.

Did you know that if you use GoodSearch instead of Google, for example, as your Internet search source, and you have selected the Lutheran Women's Missionary League as your organization/charity, the LWML receives a donation that goes toward funding our mission grants each time you connect to the Internet? Also, when you order items online with a number of select companies, GoodSearch has a pop-up window that states your purchase will earn a percentage

"Behold, I am making all things new" (Rev. 21:5).

Happy New Year! How often have you said this in the last few weeks?

For many people, the new year is an exciting time. It's a time of hope, possibility and often a time of change. New Year's resolutions are made about

many things: dieting, talking with

family more often, doing better at school, drinking less—the list goes on. Most resolutions are made with the hope of improving your life, of changing those things that you don't like about yourself and making yourself a better person. There are things in your life that you think need to be changed, and this is the year you're going to do it. This year is going to be different. This year you will not fail!

And then you fail. How many times have you actually kept a New Year's resolution for the entire year? Compare that number to how many you didn't keep. Why is that? The simple answer is that change is hard. The bad habits we have are so entrenched within us that it is very difficult to do things differently. It's always easier to do the wrong thing, and so it takes a lot of strength and determination to change our ways and do what is right. And even if we can stick with it for a while, even if we hold out for the entire year, it's so easy to slip back into our old bad habits again.

That's why I'm glad that Jesus is my Savior and not me. It doesn't matter how sincere my resolution to quit sinning is, I can't do it. Quite literally!

Surprised by love

How many times have you seen a movie where the main characters had almost given up on love and then found it when they least expected it? I know of something like this happening in real life with a pastor. He was working in his garden, sweaty and up to his

elbows in dirt, when his beautiful future wife walked around the corner of the parsonage. She was part of a traveling Christian drama troupe, and they were looking for a church where they could stay overnight. More than 26 years and four children later, they are still happily married. That's what I call being "surprised by love."

Love has a way of catching us off guard, and this is especially true when it come to God's love. There is an old saying that goes, "People need love the most when they deserve it the least." Natural, man-made religions are all about people getting what they deserve, rewards or punishments. False gods can be manipulated. "When you fast, do not look somber as hypocrites do, for they disfigure their faces to show men they are fasting. I tell you the truth, they have received their reward in full. But

when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, so that it will not be obvious to men that you are fasting, but only to your Father, who is unseen; and your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you" (Matt. 6:16-18).

During the season of Lent, one of the practices many individuals take part in is fasting. According to the Oxford American Dictionary, to fast is to go without food or without certain kinds of food, especially as a religious duty. Sometimes it can be an activity that may be given up. In an article printed in a newsletter of First St. John Lutheran Church, York, Pa., a different approach is suggested to welcome Jesus' healing touch:

- 1) Fast from anger and hatred. Give your family an extra dose of love each day.
- 2) Fast from judging others. Before making any judgments, recall how [God forgave] our faults.
- 3) Fast from discouragement. Hold on to Jesus' promise that He has a perfect plan for your life.
- 4) Fast from complaining. When you find yourself about to complain, close your eyes and recall the little moments of joy Jesus has given you.
- 5) Fast from resentment or bitterness. Work on forgiving those who may hurt you.
- 6) Fast from spending too much money. Try to reduce your spending by 10 percent and give those savings to the poor or needy.

Although any type of fasting is not means to salvation, it leads us to study and meditate on His Word and pray for guidance, that the Lord will bless and nourish each of us.

"Then you will call, and the Lord will answer; you will cry for help, and he will say, "Here I am" (Is. 58:9a).

Let us never forget the sacrifice given for us during this season of Lent.

"In like a lion, out like a lamb."

We've all heard that saying about March, haven't we? I still remember an art project I did as a youth with cotton balls for the lamb and Cheerios for the lion's mane; and if you have young people in your life, you probably will be seeing lambs and lions from their art classes as well. If March comes in quietly, it'll go out with a roar.

Oddly enough, lambs and lions are animals that are used quite frequently in the Bible in parables, visions and illustrations. The lamb is the embodiment of peace and serenity. Lambs are quiet and tranquil, non-threatening, meek. Lions, on the other hand, are mighty, fearsome, loud and dangerous. The two are opposites, almost as different as they could possibly be. But in our Lord Jesus Christ, we see both. When we think of His life, we could say "In like a lamb, out like a lamb, back in like a lion."

Christ Jesus came to us at Christmas like a lamb. He was born in humble settings, born as an infant, weak, dependent, defenseless. He did not come surrounded by armies and royalty, but by barnyard animals, shepherds and commoners. His birth was indeed announced by the stars and by angels but in a surprisingly quiet way. There was no worldwide tremor, no roar of power to announce that the Messiah had finally come. To our sinful world, He came in like a lamb.

And He came to be a lamb. In fact, not just any lamb, but the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. In His passion, His trial and His crucifixion, He became the sacrificial Lamb to atone for our sins. As Isaiah foresaw, "like a lamb that is led to the slaughter, and like a sheep that before its shearers is silent, so He opened not his mouth." Jesus Christ, the almighty, humbled Himself to be led to His death, to be slaughtered on our behalf so that we could be washed by His blood. At the cross, despite His cries of pain and agony, Jesus went out like a Lamb.

But unlike most sacrificial lambs, Jesus did not stay dead. His power and might is greater than even death itself, and He burst forth from the tomb victorious, giving each of us the victory over sin, death and the devil. His victory is our victory, and we are assured that heaven is ours because He has won it for us.

And when He comes again to take us to be with Him, He will come back like a lion. The whole world will know, and every knee will bow and every tongue confess that He is Lord, the Lion of the tribe of Judah. He will return with might and majesty, and when His voice roars, the world will tremble and melt. It will be a day of terror for those who do not believe. But for those of us who know the Lion, who know that He comes to give us the victory, it will be a day of unending joy.

This is the message of Christ that we in the LWML and all Christians are given the privilege of sharing with the world. We are given the glorious opportunity to proclaim the Word of the Lamb of God, the one who takes away the sins of the world, and the Lion of the Lord, the almighty judge and Lord of all. We can bring His life-giving message into the lives of people around us and throughout the world so that they too can rejoice in Christ Jesus, both here on earth and forever in heaven. Praise be to the Lion and the Lamb, the Alpha and the Omega, our eternal Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

The job never completed

What were Mary Magdalene, Salome and the other Mary, the mother of James, doing when they went to the tomb on Easter morning? Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus had already done a "rush job" of preparing Jesus for His burial. We are told in John 19:39 that "Nicodemus came ... bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about

seventy five pounds in weight." Undoubtedly, their preparation of the body of Jesus was cut short when the sun set on Friday evening, marking the beginning

of the Sabbath. Mark 16:1 says that on Sunday morning these women "brought spices that they might anoint him." They hoped to unwrap the linen off the body of Jesus and to do a more thorough job of preventing odors when other mourners came to visit the gravesite.

Or did they go to say their last goodbyes? We are told in Matt. 28:1 that the women went "to see the tomb." If so, this would be like a modern day visitation at the funeral home or cemetery that helps people confront the reality of death by viewing the body or burial place.

Whatever the reason they came, they never completed the job. The Bible doesn't say, but I can imagine spices were dropped or spilled as the women ran to tell the disciples the shocking news. There was no corpse to anoint, no dead body to bid goodbye, but instead a very live Jesus who startled Mary Magdalene. I doubt if anyone was ever happier to not complete a task than the women who visited the graveyard that first Easter.

Easter could be called "the job never completed." The world constantly is trying to hold funerals for Jesus by proclaiming Him either dead or irrelevant. Jesus never cooperates with these funerals and stubbornly refuses to attend them, to the great consternation of unbelievers. Our joyous task is to proclaim not only that Jesus died for our sins, but that he rose again for our justification. If we only speak of Jesus dying for our sins, isn't that only telling half the story? Our never completed job is proclaiming a living Lord Jesus. A favorite Easter hymn says, "He lives and pleads for me above"! If you ever feel like complaining, "The work of the LWML is never finished!" be glad, because it won't be done until we see our living Lord face to face.

And in the same way, the entire LWML is not about power but service. The LWML is a large, well-funded, well-structured organization. But that is not something the LWML would even consider, because the LWML is about service, not power.

To the world, that's an alien and demeaning thought. Why serve when you could have such power? But for a Christian, serving is the greatest honor, the greatest privilege. Christ Himself, creator of the universe, King of kings and Lord of lords, taught us this. "For even the

Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Mark 10:45). Jesus did not come to reap our praise and honor, but came to give of Himself completely, to sacrifice Himself for us rotten sinners who had nothing to give in return. That's real service, and that's what we as Christians strive to do.

And what better way to serve than to proclaim that message of Christ's service? There is no greater gift that we can give than to share the Gospel message of Christ with those who are in darkness and death. Yes, it takes money, yes it's hard work, and yes, there are times when it doesn't seem like it's working at all. But still, we serve, and by the power of the Holy Spirit, we persevere and continue to serve even when it seems like we should just give up, because we are called to serve, not to be served.

And so, as I finish my two years of service as junior counselor, I look forward to my two years as senior counselor not because the job is going to be any different or more powerful, but because it is a continuing opportunity to serve. And I look forward to seeing all the wonderful ways in which the LWML will continue to serve the church and the world in this next biennium.

Thanks for the memories

How do you remember something important? Do you do it the oldfashioned way and write it on the calendar in red ink? If you like more modern methods, you can set your computer or cell phone to do a pop-up reminder. I've seen plenty of people use pens to write reminders on their hands, but that's messy.

Perhaps the best way to remember something important is to have someone agree to remind you in person. I'm positive many LWML members serve as the official family "reminder."

Why do we need reminders? Because we're all so forgetful, and no, it isn't just because of age! By nature, we tend to think that God is like us, and that He has forgotten His promises to take care of all of our needs. We sound like the psalm writer who asked, "Will the Lord reject us forever? (Ps. 77: 6-8 NIV).

You were written in red on His calendar in eternity. If the best reminder of all is a personal one, imagine Jesus showing you His glorified scars. "And this is what He promised us—even eternal life" (1 John 2:25 NIV).

Have you ever thought of yourself as God's reminder to others? That's what your job is as a Christian and as a member of the LWML. You are God's personal "pop up" reminder to the people around you that God is taking care of all of their physical and spiritual needs.

"Yet I will leave seven thousand in Israel, all the knees that have not bowed to Baal, and every mouth that has not kissed him" (1 Kings 19:18).

You are not alone. That's such a comforting thought, isn't it? That's the comfort that God gave to Elijah as he was hiding in a cave lamenting the fact that he was the only one standing up for what was right.

Elijah was so overwhelmed, feeling so helpless and useless, that he prayed that God would just kill him and get it over with. Instead, God refreshed him with water and bread, spoke words of comfort and solace, and reinvigorated Elijah to get back out there and fight the good fight.

Sometimes we feel just like Elijah did. Sometimes we feel overwhelmed when we read the paper and see all the opposition and mockery heaped upon our Christian values and beliefs. Sometimes we feel like we're the only ones left who believe in God and think that living out our Christian faith is actually important. Sometimes we're ready to throw in the towel, tell God to just take us away from this valley of tears and get it over with. But when we feel this way, God comes to us with those precious words of comfort: "You are not alone."

As I'm writing this article, we just finished the district LWML convention, where more than 270 people from across the state came together in the name of Christ to hear His Word and decide how best to proclaim it through our mission grants. It was a sight to see all these mighty women (and men) of faith singing God's praise and speaking His Word. It was invigorating and a solid reminder that we are not alone. We are united in faith and purpose with every one of those people at that convention.

And then we realize that the convention was but a small portion of the total number of LWML members around South Dakota. Each representative came from their individual society, which consists of more than one person. If we take a ridiculously low number and say that each person there represented five others, we still have a force over a thousand strong! And then we consider that our district is but a small part of the national LWML body, which has over 250,000 members. But the LWML is only a part of our Synod, which is

only a part of the church worldwide. You are not alone, but you are surrounded by brothers and sisters in Christ boldly proclaiming His Gospel of forgiveness to a world trapped in darkness.

And as impressive as that might be, it's not even the best part. No matter how many fellow believers stand with us, no matter how large or small that number might be, Christ Himself is with us always. He refreshes us with the eternal waters of Baptism, with the bread that is His very body, with the power of His holy Word. He has suffered and died for us, has risen from the grave for us, and will never leave us or forsake us. In all of our mission efforts, in all of our trials and tribulations, in all of our day-to-day dealings, we are not alone because God Himself has provided His Church and His very presence. No matter how discouraged we may become or how hopeless things may seem, we are not alone. God is with us, and He has given us the eternal victory through Jesus Christ!





"My soul will be satisfied as with fat and rich food, and my mouth will praise you with joyful lips" (Ps. 63:5).

Do you know any children who are excited about an upcoming holiday in October? Is it National Stamp Collecting Month that they can't wait to celebrate? Is it Columbus Day, Canadian Thanksgiving or the anniversary of the launch of Sputnik?

Probably not. Chances are, they're excited about Halloween, a chance to dress up in costumes, go door to door in the neighborhood and, of course, collect loads of candy. It's exciting to think about all the sugary sweets that they'll have, the chocolate, candy bars and Pixy Stix that will last them for weeks (or one glorious night, if mom and dad aren't watching!).

And why shouldn't they be excited? Candy is good! It's fun to indulge yourself every now and then on some sweets, to treat yourself to a glut of sugary goodness. But could you imagine eating nothing but candy for every meal, every snack, every bite of your food? How good would you feel after even a week? How healthy would you be in a month? It wouldn't be long before you'd be craving meat, potatoes and even vegetables.

This brings us to an even better holiday in October: Reformation Day. It just happens to fall on the same day as Halloween, but it's not at all about candy. Just the opposite. When Martin Luther posted the 95 Theses, he was not sugar-coating anything. He saw the errors that the church was proclaiming—the "candy" that was making God's people spiritually sick despite its outward appeal—and he wanted to do something about it. So he spoke up, challenged the false teachings that were widely accepted, and brought some meat and potatoes into the church's diet. He was not seeking to break away from the church, but to bring good doctrinal nutrition to all so that they could grow properly in their faith, knowing the life-giving, satisfying truth of Jesus Christ.

And still today, we walk in the steps of Martin Luther, seeking to bring the fullness of Christ to everyone in our communities and across the world. Our mission work is not just candy that pleases people for a little while but really offers no nutritional value. We proclaim Christ crucified for the forgiveness of sins, the message

that brings real life to all. We do not fill the ears of people with the sweet, fluffy nothingness of this world, leaving them continually hungry and never satisfied. Instead, we give the fullness of God's Law and His Gospel, nourishing them and helping them to grow. And as with any bountiful feast, they will hunger for more. Not because God's Word does not fill and satisfy, but because of the great goodness and mercy it brings into our lives every time we hear it.

God's Word is not like the candy fluffiness of this world's empty lies. His Word fills us, satisfies us and nourishes us for the many challenges ahead. His Word instills and strengthens our faith, changes our lives and helps us to grow each day. It is the most important thing in our lives, and the most important thing that we can share with others in our families, our communities and throughout the world.

2012 Puppet Place state fair report

The year was 1972. Pastor Bob Utecht and family presented a Christian magic and puppet show in a tent at the South Dakota State Fair. Forty years later, the Utecht family continues to present a puppet show at the state fair. The puppet show is given five times daily for the five days of the fair. This year the show was "Bible Olympics." Adam and Eve were the first competitors in America's game of baseball. They were in the Big-inning. Some of the other competitors were Noah in the rowing competition, Sampson in weight lifting, Moses in basketball and Paul running the race. All the competitors were disqualified at the medal stand for the bad things they had done. One man — Jesus — came to their rescue and took their bad things upon Himself. By believing in Jesus, the competitors were given the crown of righteousness. The crown of righteousness lasts longer than any Olympic medal. We also can receive the Crown of Righteousness by believing in Jesus Christ. The Bible study "Prayer" was given to 235 adults after the puppet show. LWML zones furnishing volunteers at the Puppet Place were Mitchell, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Yankton and Aberdeen. There were thirty-four adults and one youth who volunteered and invited fairgoers to the shows. The puppet show was viewed by 1,495 fairgoers. Thank you to the Utecht family members, June Ring and Dorothea Geidel, for preparing and presenting the puppet shows. Please pray that God will use this ministry to bring people to the true faith in Him.
